Change to our Bylaws - Last month Hank informed the membership about a change we need to make to our bylaws. We need to change the definition of a quorum to be '25 members in good standing'. This proposed change was posted in the *Rocky Tales* newsletter of January 1st. Jack Hodges made a motion to accept the change. The motion was seconded. A vote was taken and the motion was passed. The bylaws will be amended.

Letter to BLM regarding new collecting rules - Hank spoke about the board receiving a letter from the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineral Societies (Federation), of whom we are members. The Federation has approximately 8600 members. The letter informed the board of the changes the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is proposing to make related to mineral & fossil collecting. It further went on to express several concerns that The Federation has with the proposed regulation. There were concerns related to semantic clarification of 'invertebrate' and 'vertebrate' fossils/fossil collecting, and definitions of terms such as 'casual collector', 'reasonable amount' and others, and issues related to casual collecting on Federal Lands. It was felt that further clarification was necessary to administer the regulation consistently and fairly. Hank stated that our board voted to 'sign on' to the letter to oppose the new law.

Field Trip to Quartzsite - Barry talked about our field trip/camp out planned for Quartzsite. This will be our 4th annual camp out along Plumosa Rd (5 mi N of Quartzsite). We plan to camp out from Tuesday, Jan 17th through Sunday Jan 22nd. We have the opportunity to join up with the Quartzsite Roadrunners Gem & Mineral Club on some field trips or do some rock collecting on our own. We will also be spending time at the various rock shows (QIA, Desert Gardens & Tyson Wells) in Quartzsite. We will be having a potluck on Saturday at 5:00 pm. These trips are a great time to get to know members better and have lots of fun. An email will be sent out with more specific information on the trip.

Silent Auction – Ed Darnell informed the membership that we will be holding our annual *Silent Auction* at our February meeting on the 10th. This is one of our fund raising events where members donate rock/lapidary items for the auction. Mineral Fun Fact - The Largest US Iron Meteorite?

The largest Iron Meteorite found in the us is the "Willamette" discovered by Hughes and Dale on land owned by the Oregon Iron and Steel Company in what is now West Linn in 1902. At 15fi tons, the iron meteorite is the largest in the United States.

The two decided they should buy the land where the meteorite sat. The steel company wouldn't sell, so Hughes stole the meteorite using "horse, windlass and steel cable." In 1905 Oregon Iron and Steel filed a suit for the return of the meteorite and won. The massive hunk of iron was later sold and has been at the American Museum of Natural History in New York City since 1906 until a 30-pound chunk of the meteorite was put up for auction on Oct 28 by Bonham's auction house in New York. where it failed to bring the \$1.1 million minimum price sought by its owner, Darryl Pitt. The high bid of \$300,000 for the piece of the meteorite came by telephone and matched the minimum price for the next highest priced object. The Willamette was withdrawn.

Wulfenite is now Arizona's State Mineral

Rep. Mark Finchem introduced HB2092 in the House to have the mineral, Wulfenite, become Arizona's state mineral. We have a state gem, turquoise, and a state metal, copper, but Arizona is one of the few states in the Union that did not have a state mineral, and none is as famous and well known around the world for over 125 years than our state's beautiful wulfenite.

HB2092 was assigned to the Energy, Environment and Natural Resources committee for a hearing. According to your editor's research, this bill passed in January, take a look at our State Mineral.


